Dance is a vital form of art that is often underrepresented in institutions like museums. In dance, our bodies are the paintbrush and the world is our canvas. It is performative, occupying space and elapsing time, and it is a particular challenge to capture motion within one static moment, one gesture to convey the entirety of a performance. Yet, it is a challenge many artists have endeavored for centuries.

We dance to celebrate, to commemorate, to commiserate and to initiate. It can be the play of free expression, or impressive physical achievements rigidly choreographed. Dance can serve a social function that communicates ideas beyond barriers of spoken language, allowing us to say with our bodies what we cannot put into words. Usually dance is paired with music, but it doesn't have to be.

Dance serves ritualistic and religious functions in historic cultures worldwide. We dance to entreat deities, remember our forebearers and to maintain traditions. We dance to celebrate the changing seasons of our world and the changing seasons of life.



Common Thread: Photographs by Theresa Segal

On view in the Balcony Gallery for Florida Artists, "Common Thread" is an anthology of photographs by Florida artist Theresa Segal. Included are images taken throughout Florida, as well as a selection of prints from a collaborative photography project exploring Baracoa, Cuba, that are part of the Appleton's permanent collection.

Spanning the artist's career, subject matter ranges from the formal gardens of Vizcaya in Miami to the storage spaces of the Lightner Museum in St. Augustine. Also explored with intimacy and a singular aesthetic are the familiar surroundings of historic neighborhoods, parks and expansive rural landscapes.

Segal was born in St. Augustine, where she attended Flagler College and later taught photography in the same classroom where she had discovered her love of the medium. She studied photography at the Southeast Center for Photography at Daytona State College and the University of North Florida. The artist has received numerous grants for her work including several Individual Artist Grants from the Community Foundation of Northeast Florida, the Florida Department of State and The National Endowment for the Arts.


Theresa Segal, "Dress Forms," Lightner Museum, 2014, Digital fine art print, 14 x 20 in.

Every Fiber of My Being: Abstract Fiber Art by Charlita Rae Whitehead

On view now in the second-floor Preview Gallery, "Every Fiber of My Being" invites viewers to experience Charlita Rae Whitehead's abstract fiber art. Whitehead, a self-taught artist, has been working in the tufting medium since 2022. Tufting is an electric version of punch needle embroidery, which uses a long, hollow needle with a beveled point to push yarn through material to form a continuous loop stitch. In addition to tufting, the artist uses a variety of tools and materials to create her dreamy yet expressive tapestries, incorporating traditional punch needle methods, different types of yarn and varying pile heights to create topographical hills and valleys.

The history of making rugs goes back thousands of years and has been an important part of many cultures and traditions around the globe. In "Every Fiber of My Being," Whitehead celebrates and reinterprets the lineage of rug making, honoring the resilience and ingenuity of generations past.



CURATORIAL NEWS

Gallery Updates



If you've visited the Appleton lately, you may have noticed several of the permanent collection galleries have been reinstalled. In the northeast corner on the second floor, selections from the museum's extensive Art Deco holdings are now on view. You might remember some of the objects from the recent "Skylines to Hemlines" exhibition. Due to the show's huge success, plans at this time are to exhibit art and objects from the Art Deco era year-round in this space, periodically rotating the items on view.

While on the second floor, don't forget to check out the European galleries. Several works have been added, including a still-life by Jean Baptiste Robie (Belgian, 1821–1910) and a collection of French decorative glass from Émile Gallé (French, 1846–1904) and the Daum Frères studio (founded 1875).

New to the first floor, see "Ancient Pathways: A Legacy of Trade." Organized by Appleton intern Luke Craig, this exhibition focuses on the influences of the Silk Road, born during China's Han Dynasty. More than a lucrative silk trade, the Silk Road was a bustling highway network where not just goods, but ideas, cultures and religions were exchanged among great civilizations like China, Rome and Persia. This international trade continued for more than a millennium, peaking during China's golden ages — the Tang and Song dynasties (618–1279).




