

## **WEEK FOUR: ART ANIMALS SUPPLY LIST**

### **Eagle Project:**

- Apron or paint shirt
- Covered workspace (newspapers, old vinyl tablecloth)
- Access to a sink to wash brushes
- Small containers to hold water
- Paint: black
- Roller: A piece of PVC, heavy cardboard tube, rolling pin, brayer
- Plastic wrap to wrap your “brayer” to give it a slightly “giving” surface
- Styrofoam plate: luncheon or dinner size (any sheet of Styrofoam bigger than 4” X 4” can be used)
- Pencil, sharpened
- 4’ X 4” cardboard square
- Paper for your prints

### **Elephant Project:**

- Elephant template (page 4)
- Apron or paint shirt
- Covered workspace (newspapers, old vinyl tablecloth)
- Access to a sink to wash brushes
- Small containers to hold water
- 4” Plastic lid, paper plate or sheets of wax paper for paint
- Glue, both liquid and stick
- Scissors
- Drawing paper 9 X 12” off-white construction paper works well
- Painters Tape
- Pencil
- Acrylic paint, yellow, red, black
- Large (1”) and ¼” flat painting brush
- Smaller round brush
- Black Permanent Marker

### **Lion Project:**

- Apron or paint shirt
- Covered workspace (newspapers, old vinyl tablecloth)
- Access to a sink to wash brushes
- Small containers to hold water

- Cardboard, approximately 12" X 15". (The project is easy to scale down to a smaller size)
- Approximately 4 ½" lid or round shape to trace
- 3 sheets construction paper: Brown, orange and yellow
- Large, brown paper grocery store bag
- Binder clips, clothespins, paperclips: used to hold folds while drying
- Paint: Yellow, red, black, green
- Paint brushes: 1" flat, ¼" flat, small round
- Black permanent marker
- Tacky Glue

### Horse Project:

- Apron or paint shirt
- Covered workspace (newspapers, old vinyl tablecloth)
- Access to a sink to wash brushes
- Small containers to hold water
- Scratch paper
- pencil
- Preprinted template (pages 5 and 6)
- Cardboard, 18 oz cereal box

### Owl Project:

- Air Dry Clay
  - Alternatives to Air Dry Clay:
    - Salt Dough Clay
    - Play dough
- Cardboard "Placemat" to roll clay on: the inside of a cereal box works well
- Rolling Pin: a firm cardboard tube, a piece of PVC, a cylinder such as a plastic bottle
- Plastic or regular spoon
- Pencil, toothpick, straw, fork, paper clip as clay tools
- Cap to a thin permanent marker or something similar
- Few bottle caps, same height
- Acrylic Paint, colors of your choice
- Paint Brushes
- Apron or paint shirt
- Covered workspace (newspapers, old vinyl tablecloth)
- Access to a sink to wash brushes
- Small container to hold water
- Plastic lid, paper plate or sheets of wax paper for paint
